Why I Should Join My Local Neighborhood Association

Many of us are fortunate enough to live in one of the beautiful Victorian Flatbush neighborhoods. It doesn't matter if we own or rent, we all benefit from the beauty, cohesiveness, and friendliness of these neighborhoods that are more like living in a suburb or a park than in a major urban center, New York City. We are close to Manhattan by subway or car and we can park with ease in our driveways or the local streets. If you take a walk on Cortelyou Road, there is a good chance that you will meet people that you know, or pass people who will be happy to smile and say hello. We live in a great neighborhood.

Downzoning

The neighborhoods are great because many people with a sense of community have organized into neighborhood associations to protect the things we love and continue to improve our quality of life.

Many of you may not know that the city zoning in Victorian Flatbush would have allowed for hundreds of our beautiful homes to be knocked down and replaced with six story

apartment buildings. Can you imagine what that would do to the quality of life if it happened on your block? Many people, working through their local neighborhood associations and Community Board 14, managed to get the zoning changed so our neighborhoods can never again be threatened by developers. That took dedicated people, associations, letters, phone calls, meetings, and four and a half years to accomplish.

Landmarking

There is now a group of people working with the local neighborhood associations and the Flatbush Development Corporation trying to get landmark status. If you want to know why that is important, go look at the house on Argyle Road between Ditmas and Dorchester. The house that bricked up the front from the ground to the third floor. How would you like to walk out of your house and look at that every day? What do you think that did to the values of the houses nearby?

Security & More

Many things get accomplished by neighbors getting together and recognizing the problems, forming a plan of action, and working to solve them. We are fortunate to have these neighborhood associations so we have an opportunity to affect change. How about personal safety? Most neighborhoods have Security Patrols to help keep us safe. We have a green market on Cortelyou Road also brought to you by neighbors working through their neighborhood associations. The general upgrading of Cortelyou Road was a cooperative effort of the Flatbush Development Corporation, Councilman Mathieu Eugene, Cortelyou Road Merchants, and local neighborhood associations. In the Garden Corner

May. High Spring and April's showers will indeed bring us May flowers: lilacs, late tulips, wisteria, bluebells, early lilies, azaleas, rhododendrons, and locust and linden trees, among others. It has been a beautiful spring. Don't let me forget dogwood, which is just outside my window as I type. Of course, it is also the time of the flowering annuals.

The full moon of May 25th is, quite appropriately, the flower moon. It is also the sheep shearing moon. The new moon of May 9th and the annual solar eclipse are not visible here. Days still increase in length; we gain about an hour of daylight in May.

May temperatures can range from 30° to 100°, and there are often periods of heavy rains in May (and droughts). Orthodox Easter is May 5th, while May 9th is Ascension Thursday in the Western church. Mothers' Day is May 12th. May 15th is Shavuot and May 19th is Pentecost, and May 27th is the observation of Memorial Day.

Saturn dominates the night sky. By the end of the month Venus is low in the western sky shortly after sunset. On the 27th and 28th Venus and Jupiter are close, with faint Mercury just above them, but as they are low in the sky, only 6° above the horizon, and the sunset glow remains, it makes them hard to see. Mars is low in the northeast at sunrise.

Our soils are warming up, so we can set out our newly purchased annuals and our seedlings, which we started indoors. Don't be too hasty; chilly soils can inhibit root development and some plants never do well if planted too early. It's time to set up your outdoor watering and fertilizing schedules. Yes, you can move those indoor plants to deck or patio late in the month. If possible, move them when cloudy weather is predicted so you avoid leaf burn. Our gardens need about an inch of water a week, between our efforts and rainfall. A drip irrigation system saves water and gets it to the roots, but try not to have it on automatic because there is no need to run it if we have enough rain.

As you buy/plant annuals, consider the Greenest Block in Brooklyn contest. Will we win? Maybe not, but we all win when our homes and gardens look good with effective plant colors and arrangements. The judges make their first visits in June.

Be aware that powdery mildew has been attacking **impatiens walleriana**, a very popular and much used variety of impatiens, used in bedding and pots – both the single and double varieties. The mildew ruins the appearance of the plants and then basically kills them. Check plant labels, and ask your supplier. New Guinea impatiens is not affected. Other alternatives are begonias, pansies, nasturtiums, coleus and petunias. Avoid most phlox as they are also subject to powdery mildew.

When planting — annuals, perennials, vegetables, anything – be sure to water them in, when you plant, and then the next day. The adage that it is the second day's watering that really counts is a reminder that you can't plant and forget. Don't rely on Mother Nature! Plant no deeper than the soil level in the pot. The exception is tomatoes! Their stems can be buried 4 or 5 inches below pot level and at a 45° angle. Caladium corms can be planted at the end of May or the beginning of June. They are tropical plants and want warm soils, but not too much sun. Cannas, also tropical, want sun.

Leave bulb foliage to mature, and then cut it and always compost. If you find the maturing foliage unsightly, overplant with colorful annuals. Once lilacs fade, cut off the blossom heads, but not the leaves at the base. The same technique applies to rhododendrons, but you can twist off those spent blossoms manually. If azaleas have grown too vigorously, prune them just after blooming to slightly lower than you want them to be, so buds will form for next year's bloom and be a good show. Cut forsythia on the same "cut just after bloom" schedule. If you have seen forsythia or azalea with

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(Garden continued from page 3.) spotty bloom, they are probably plants that were pruned too late, and the buds for this year were sheared off.

It is always weeding season. Do it when the ground is damp. Encourage children to give you dandelion bouquets. No children? Then at least pull off the blossoms so they will not set seed, even if you have no time to weed, or your back will not let you!

There is still time to tie your climbing roses to horizontals.
